Our work at Ngukurr

- Sitting with families
- Listening to them
- Hearing their thoughts, their feelings going through this election process

Community voices

"Should have Kriol speakers, Kriol hand outs"

"People inside Ngukurr can give information. Talk in Kriol. Not big words. People will understand"

"Need to explain numbering – some just know from school time go from top to bottom"

"We just go and put something in the box and pretend that person will help. No story behind those names"

"You put the numbers in the boxes if your party lost you feel like you didn't do the right thing"





Hearing from the community

- Important that information is in Kriol
- Kriol speakers in the community can help others
- Giving more meaningful information to communities

Community voices

"My granddaughter didn't turn up for election because she was too shy. She told us I don't want to go because I don't know how to vote"

"At school can practice task so people can be confident when the time comes"

"Social media is the best way to engage with young adults and teenagers. Can't get their attention by talking. Has to be on the screen"

"Our people don't really understand the groups, the parties they are voting for"

"Some local elder people can guide because that is culture way"





Also important to support the young people

- New ones who haven't voted yet
- Between 16-18 years

Information from community that can get into electoral commission and political area



People really trying to be involved, but don't know the meaning of why they will be involved

What we were talking about when sitting down

- How to get that understanding for people
- And from politicians and electoral commission

How to go forward? Electoral commissions and government

- Have seen this in the school already
- Practical learning
